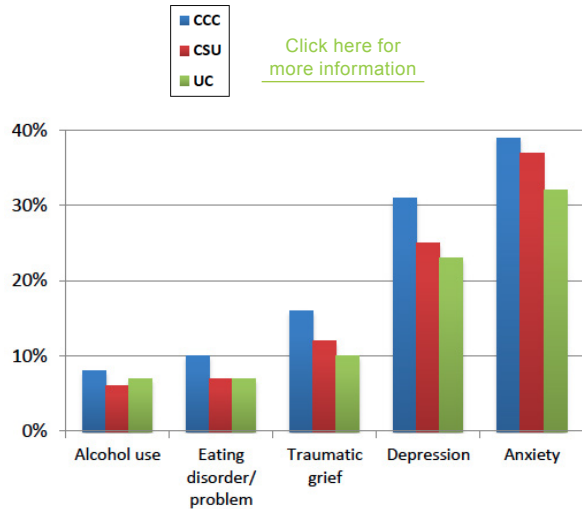

Students from the CCC system reported consistently higher rates of impaired academic performance due to mental health issues than their counterparts in the other systems of higher education (CSU and UC).

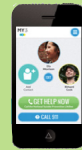
2.3 million students* served throughout **113** California community colleges.
