- Complete only one survey per college.
- Deadline for completing the survey: November 22, 2024
- 1. Print the attached pdf:
 - Use as a worksheet to gather information requested in order to enter complete information online in one sitting.
 - Keep this hard copy for your records. This will serve as reference for completing the survey next year.
- 2. Read over all survey items and highlight those that may require more time or may require consultation with others to collect.
 - Consider sending emails right away to those who may be able to provide you with the information; consider delegating to others who can assist you.
 - Enter information as it is received, onto the hard copy worksheet.
 - Refer to "DEFINITIONS" (p.3) if you have questions regarding terms used.

Why is it important for our college to participate in this survey?

- Provides critical data (evidence) to support advocacy for the health and student success
 of California Community College (CCC) students throughout the state.
- Highlights the fiscal status of our programs and describes collaborations with relevant agencies, grantors, and community partners.
- Organizes data on the infrastructure and program activities of CCC Health Services.
- Assists in orienting health services professionals regarding compliance, program development and administrative issues in the CCC system.
- Provides ongoing information to health services personnel on program models throughout the state in support of local program development and advocacy.
- Offers trend analysis and reporting on the status of CCC health centers and services.
- Identifies training needs and professional development topics for HSACCC and MHWA conferences and meetings.

Why do you ask me to do this every year?

- The larger the number and more complete the survey responses each year, the more valuable the information is for everyone.
- Annual trends demonstrate how our services and system is dynamic and changing quickly.
 Current information provides an accurate snapshot of areas of need in order to prioritize system response.
- Offers a way to track trends each year on the local level. Time spent organizing this information is readily applicable to Program Review and Accreditation requirements.

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DEFINITIONS and REFERENCES

Unduplicated Headcount - The total number of individual students enrolled

Credit Courses – Courses that provide credit to a student at the end of the class in their academic records. These courses may be taken as a "credit - no credit" option, or a "pass-no pass" option, but at the end of the course the student receives credit on their record.

Non-Credit Courses – Courses that do not provide credit to a student at the end of the class.

Campus SAVE ACT – A Federal law that requires comprehensive and specific Prevention, Response and Reporting of sexual misconduct on college campuses. http://thecampussaveact.com/faq/; https://www.acenet.edu/Documents/VAWA-Summary.pdf

Campus Opioid Safety Act – aims to reduce opioid-related overdoses and deaths through public colleges and universities providing life-saving education, information, and federally approved opioid overdose reversal medication on campus. The law is in effect as of January 1, 2023. https://www.cdph.ca.gov/Programs/CCDPHP/sapb/Pages/Campus-Opioid-Safety-Act.aspx

DFSCA (DRUG-FREE SCHOOLS AND COMMUNITIES ACT) – A Federal law that requires all institutions of higher education that receive Federal money for financial aid purposes, to provide a substance abuse prevention program. Certain activities are required and reports are due every two years. https://www.congress.gov/bill/101st-congress/house-bill/3614/text

COLA – Cost of Living Adjustment. Education Code specifies the CCC Health Fee may increase by increments of \$1 based on a State calculation of an inflation index (price deflator). When inflation has increased sufficiently the CCC Chancellor's Office notifies the system that a \$1 increase is allowable. This notice is customarily sent in late February to all district finance and student services administrators. Family PACT- California's Family Planning, Access, Care and Treatment program, to provide comprehensive family planning services to eligible low-income men and women. http://www.familypact.org/

LEA – Local Education Agency – A billing option program that allows CCCs to receive reimbursements for providing health and mental health services to students who are covered by Medi-Cal. https://www.dhcs.ca.gov/ProvGovPart/Pages/LEA.aspx

MAA – Medi-Cal Administrative Activities program - A federal matching program under Medi-Cal that reimburses select agencies for work being done to improve access to Medi-Cal covered services. http://californiamaa.org/

MHSA – Mental Health Services Act – A California law that taxes individuals earning more than \$1,000,000/year, 1% of their income to support mental health services across the State. Current and comprehensive information on mental health in the California community colleges (first funded through MHSA) maybe be found here: https://cccstudentmentalhealth.org/

SBIRT – Screening, Brief Intervention, Referral and Treatment services, typically used in the context of alcohol screening. https://www.integration.samhsa.gov/clinical-practice/sbirt

CLIA – Clinical Laboratory Improvement Amendments - A federal program for certification and oversight of clinical laboratory testing. https://www.cdc.gov/clia/law-regulations.html

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SLO - Student Learning Outcome – A statement of a desired outcome that measures what students learn as a direct result of an intervention. Student Support services may implement "Service Area Learning Outcomes" (SAOs). This is an Accreditation requirement for community colleges. https://www.cas.edu/
